More than 120 secondary school pupils spent the day acting out various scenes from Shakespeare's plays, while three finalists in each category performed in an evening showcase.





Rotary Youth Exchange Programme 2020

What is RYE ?

This year thousands of young people will have the opportunity of a lifetime - a chance to live in another country and see the world and themselves from a new perspective through a Rotary Youth Exchange (RYE).

RYE is an international exchange programme for high school students who are between 15 and up to 18 years of age. As an RYE student you will spend 12 months in an overseas country, attending school while living with several host families. You will make friends in your host country and with other exchange students from around the world. You will likely learn a new language, a new way of living and a great deal about yourself. You will continue to benefit from a Rotary exchange for many years after the exchange is completed.

Students are hosted by a community Rotary Club which organise host families and provide a counsellor for advice and day-to-day contact. Each student is involved with their hosting Rotary Club and activities organised by the Rotary Youth Exchange Programme.

RYE is not about "sending" students on an exchange but about facilitating a cultural experience within which the student can develop and grow and learn about the world around them and, in the process, make lifelong friends from all around the world.

Where can I go ?

We have a select number of countries that we exchange with and this can vary so check our website for details.

When applying for an exchange you nominate your three preferred countries and we endeavour to provide one of your choices, but you might also choose a different country for your exchange.

The philosophy of the Rotary exchange programme is that the experience itself is the key and this is not country dependent.

We typically have a longstanding exchange relationship with our exchange partner countries and know that we can rely on them. We have often met, face-to-face, the key people involved in the operation of the programme in these countries.

Speaking the language of the exchange country is not essential but having taken a language at school is definitely an advantage.

"The most important thing I learnt during my Rotary Youth Exchange in Finland, which continues to help me navigate through both professional and personal life today, is the humanity that we share in common with people all over the world. That humanity bridges racial, religious, political and language boundaries. It is the one single trait that binds us all into one very small, beautiful world. I believe this is the greatest contribution that the Rotary Youth Exchange programme gives to each individual exchange student and, through the cumulative experiences and friendships created by the programme, to the world as a whole."

Level Two Hard Materials students have had a great opportunity this year to work on an authentic brief working with DOC to create traps to humanely kill rats, stoats, weasels and hedgehogs. Working alongside predator Free 2050 brings together central and local government, iwi, philanthropists, non-government organisations, businesses, science and research organisations, communities, landowners and individuals. Using DC200 traps, our class have designed and created traps using advanced procedures. During the project they learnt how to set the traps safely and will be using them at their homes to catch pests. 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
DOC's DILEMMA: balancing biodiversity and visitors.

The Department of Conservation manages almost one third of New Zealand's land area, including some of our most visited spots and iconic scenery will. Legally, it is required to protect fragile ecosystems and threatened species AND manage the ever-increasing demands for visitor access to them.

Its budget is split roughly 50:50 between these conservation and visitor management roles. Criticism – often trenchant and emotional – comes from both sides of this divide.

In this Catalyst Conversation, DOC's director-general Lou Sanson will look at the issues, ways forward and how the community can help.

Lou Sanson has headed DOC since September 2013, after 11 years as chief executive of Antarctica New Zealand. In this latter role, he oversaw the deepest ever multi-national sedimentary science drilling project in Antarctica (ANDRILL) and led the development of Antarctica's largest wind turbine project to reduce fossil fuel use at McMurdo Station and Scott Base.

Prior to this, he was DOC's Southland Conservator, in charge of Fiordland National Park and Stewart Island. During this time, he led the establishment of Rakiura National Park, the sub-Antarctic World Heritage Area, one of the world's largest island pest eradication projects and helped establish the southern network of marine reserves.






