Principal's Message

Kia ora and welcome to the Wakatipu High School newsletter - and it is a bumper edition with us being offline last week with our Teacher Only Day on restorative practise. Week 10 has been a good one here, including with Matatu training getting underway in earnest. Particularly for new parents, Matatu Assembly is our annual House Haka-waiata competition. It is a great WHS event, and please do encourage your student to be involved - definitely including Year 9s. The Assembly itself is on the afternoon of Friday 3rd July, the last day of term, and parents are able to come and watch - more details next week.

This afternoon was our Sports Assembly, and while sport has been impacted by Covid-19 it was great to acknowledge participation and achievements of our sports - which are very impressive, including four of our students who represented NZ at the Winter Youth Olympics (20% of the NZ Team!) and 11 NZ representatives. Thanks to parents who came along to support, and to everyone who makes these opportunities possible for our students.

Another positive point this week is that uniform is definitely looking better. While we have a few slow learners most students are wearing the correct uniform correctly. A big thanks to parents for their support with this.

Academic Achievement - you may recall me saying previously re how we look at data to identify schools who are doing well so that we can visit and learn from them, and that it was becoming difficult to find schools who were doing much better than us.

The 2019 national NCEA data came out last week and when we looked at the combination of our two key areas, ie Level 2 and University Entrance, compared to all 234 state secondary schools (ie co-ed, boys and girls) we were 8th, and compared to the 187 state co-ed schools we were 2nd. In terms of our students leaving WHS with their best possible qualification and heading out into the world with as many options and opportunities as possible this is great, and our levels of achievement, ie 92% for Level 2 and 80% for UE, means that it is a large number of our students rather than just a small group of high-achievers. When you consider the extracurricular and holistic opportunities on offer here at WHS it feels like we are delivering a great all-round education to our students.

Break 3 Trial - our timetable has three breaks during the day, which are 15, 40 and 40 minutes long. For some time now we have been considering the length of the third break, and before lockdown had begun a process to look at it more closely. We have now concluded that process, which has included input from students and staff, and have decided to trial shortening the third break to 20minutes for Term 3. This means that for Term 3 school will finish at 3.10pm (instead of 3.30pm as currently).

A point to note for MoE bus students: when we began considering this trial we approached the bus provider re potentially running the buses 20mins earlier and they had indicated that this should be ok, however the MoE has now said that it is not possible for a trial. By way of explanation, six of our nine MoE buses have to wait for a small number of primary students to arrive on a 'transfer bus' to then be transported on our buses. This is actually an issue for us irrespective of the trial, including that it means that these buses arrive at school much earlier in the morning than we would ideally like. While we will continue to work on this, at this stage most of these buses will run at the same times next term.

Huge demand for Kia Kaha Queenstown Lakes hub continues

QLDC's update regarding the Hub - The Kia Kaha Queenstown Lakes Hub 'pop up' established by the Queenstown Lakes District Council (QLDC) has been booked out in almost every session since it opened on Thursday 4 June. So far the hub has supported over 400 migrants and employers with more sessions in Queenstown due to be added next week. If you haven't been able to attend a session, they have been recorded and are available here. The most important advice for migrants is to stay informed and be prepared, even if you don't plan on returning home. Five top tips:

- Register with your embassy even if you're not planning to go home – embassies are providing support and information to their citizens. Contact details at www.mfat. govt.nz/embassies.
- 2. Contact Immigration New Zealand to update them on your current situation and receive information on your options.
- Register with a travel agent to get the latest government repatriation/ commercial flight options in case you want to go home.
- 4. Register to come along to the Kia Kaha Queenstown Lakes Hub to get information and advice on visa queries, repatriation, employment, finance, wellbeing and welfare to help you make informed decisions about staying in New Zealand or returning home. This is a great opportunity to talk to Immigration NZ, independent immigration advisers, MSD, local travel agents, and support services in one location. The seminars are also being streamed online via QLDC's Facebook page and YouTube channel so you can watch them when it suits you.
- Get ready to travel if you're planning to go home. Start talking to your landlord about your lease, organise selling/donating/ disposing of items, rehome your pets, have a plan to arrange disconnection of your utilities etc.

The Give Time team - update!



We have had meetings with Volunteer Central for possible collaboration opportunities, progress reporting to our Project Phoenix guardian Julie Scott and also scheduled meetings with other High Schools in Otago who are keen to get their students signed up to Give Time when it is launched.

I feel very privileged to be the mentor of this talent trio and it has been fantastic to see their resilience and perseverance in action as they have not been put off by short term obstacles and problems. It was great to see the students eager to support and engage with those that were less connected with loved ones during the lockdown period.





We also had a conference call with the student volunteer coordinator at Mount Aspiring College in Wanaka [photo attached]. Their volunteer program works with Year 13 students in particular and she was also impressed with using Give Time as a platform and tool to connect her students with appropriate volunteering opportunities.



All concepts have been confirmed and cleared by the developer and graphic designer. We are now just waiting for funds to be applied for and approved [a longer process than we anticipated!] to give them the green light. It should then be ready to launch in just 4 weeks. The agenda for next week includes to locate and contact appropriate organisations that we would like to list/approach to appear on our database for volunteers to connect with. This is proving a time consuming process to find and locate contact names and details for each organisation contact person, but with some perseverance we will get there and make it easier for everyone else to connect with relevant volunteer opportunities.

The other 75% of the mark is split equally between best external design , quality of workmanship and how well the team work collaboratively in their selected group.

We will be having a 'test day' in week 11 and the final race in week 12. The circuit has been created and students have been learning about the most effective way to win the speed race. Such considerations include track conditions, angles of cornering, centre of gravity and kart stability amongst others. Theory work is all well and good but being a practical subject, I wanted to get them testing their learning. Game Over was approached and accepted our requested to test and race their Game Over karts. Students were set up in teams and top male and female racers gained prizes which were carefully selected by myself, some British baked goods!
