#### ADVERSE WEATHER

We are now approaching the time of year when adverse weather, including snow and ice, can affect roads and buses and the operation of the school. This year with a mixed bus model, both with school buses and public buses, there is an added level of coordination required and potentially different possibilities that we will communicate to our community. Below are the two main adverse weather scenarios and the methods of communication that we will use re adverse weather.

#### **Adverse Weather Overnight and early Morning**

We will liaise with QLDC's roading contractor and the bus coordinator and make a decision re any changes to the school day. If changes are made they are likely to be:

- a) School is open as normal, however some buses may be delayed or cancelled.
- b) School has a delayed start (usually 10am), with a compacted timetable. Buses may be delayed or cancelled.
- c) School is closed.

Please note that we liaise with all the schools in the Wakatipu Basin, and our decisions are generally coordinated (although sometimes conditions are different for schools).

#### **Adverse Weather During the School Day**

Please note that closing the school early is problematic for a number of reasons (notably trying to run all buses early), and we will try and run school until the normal end of day if at all possible. Accordingly we do not want parents coming to school to collect their children unless specifically notified to do so. The likely scenarios for adverse weather events during the school day are:

- a) School runs until normal time, and buses run as normal.
- b) School runs until normal time, but some buses run early &/or runs are altered.
- c) School closes early, with buses also running early. In some cases bus routes may be altered.
- d) In an extreme adverse weather event students may be kept at school until travel is safe or even stay overnight.

#### **Communication**

We will use the following channels for communicating with parents and students about adverse weather impacts:

- WHS App alert please download the free WHS App and sign up for alerts
- Text NB please ensure the school office has your correct mobile number
- WHS Website we put any adverse weather information on here
- Radio announcements will also be made on local radio stations

Our primary concern is the safety of our students and this will always be paramount in our decision making. Please note that this also includes us being mindful of our student drivers and we ask that parents proactively monitor student vehicle use during winter, and ensure that vehicles are equipped for winter driving conditions.



#### 13 REASONS WHY

#### Netflix '13 Reasons Why' Season Two - info and advice for parents

You may be aware of the public discussion generated by the <u>Netflix series '13 Reasons Why'</u> last year. This show was widely watched and talked about by teenagers last year.

Season Two will be released worldwide on Friday 18 May. In Season One, themes of suicide, sexual assault, consent, bullying and other issues made some viewers feel distressed and in need of support, and similar and equally confronting themes will be present in Season Two.

In the lead-up to the release, some young people may re-watch the first Season, or watch it for the first time. Young people may feel the show represents the issues they face. Banning, or recommending a ban on viewing it can be harmful as young people will still watch it but feel they have to hide that from adults. The issues raised in the series are significant, and offer a good opportunity to talk to our young people about these difficult life events - but it is important that those conversations are safe ones. To help parents with this, information is available on the resource hub of the Mental Health Foundation website. Additional support material will be added to this hub prior to 18 May. The Office of Film and Literature Classification has also released a guide for parents: Talking with young people about what they're watching.

If you are concerned about a young person, please seek help. The Mental Health Foundation have a list of contacts, or phone your local DHB's Mental Health Crisis Team. Support is also available from a trained Counsellor anytime by calling or texting 1737. <u>OECD research shows</u> that **reading for pleasure is the single most important indicator of a child's future success.** 

Studies also have found that exposure to fiction increases empathy, as well as having a positive correlation with social support. Reading for pleasure has health benefits including reducing stress: Mindlab International's research found that tension eased and heart rates slowed down in subjects who read silently for as little as six minutes.

The research also shows that reading for pleasure at school is strongly influenced by relationships between teachers and children, and children and families. Parents are influential in developing early reading for enjoyment, and if books are valued from a young age, this is likely to continue. We need to take a collective approach across school and community.

So come on, everyone - STOP, DROP & READ!!!




