R E P O R T I N G



Information regarding students engagement, learning, progress and achievement is always live and available through the WHS Portal. However, a comprehensive Mid-Year report will be made available on the Portal for Seniors on Friday 6 July and Monday 30 July for Juniors.

In addition to the information that is readily available through the Portal, the Senior Mid-Year Report will include a cover sheet that outlines the student's Academic Goal and current prediction. The prediction is an indicator of what the student is on track to achieve (or not), as of 22 June, assuming they maintain their current levels of achievement. Kaiārahi have been meeting with students to discuss the prediction and what changes, if any, are required to achieve their academic goal. If you have any questions regarding any general information in this report you should contact the Kaiārahi in the first instance. If you have subject specific information, please contact the relevant subject teacher.

Again, Junior Mid-Year Reports will be available on the Portal from Monday 30 July, and we will have our Junior Next Steps in mid-August, when parents will again meet with Kaiārahi.

AFTER SCHOOL SECURITY

We will be implementing some changes commencing at the start of Term 3 around after-school security to ensure we are meeting our legal obligations related to use of the facilities and supervision. All students who are not present for a supervised school event must have left the building by 5pm at the latest. Students who are present for a supervised school event that has a delayed start (e.g. netball at 4.45pm) will only be allowed to congregate at the front of the school in the Foyer and Library area. The learning commons will be closed off and not available for access (unless they are with a staff member). This may mean that students attending sport in the gymnasium will need to exit via the front door and re-enter in the side Gymnasium door - as the internal doors will be shut.

If your student is waiting for you to finish work, or waiting to access other facilities nearby (eg Kip McGrath, Site Trampoline) they will need to make alternate arrangements after 5.00pm. We recommend the Wakatipu Youth Trust who have a Drop in Center (Youth Booth) at 15 Red Oaks Drive which is across the street. This is open until 6pm each day during the school term and has XBOX, Pool Table, Air Hockey, Ping Pong, Sound System, Computers and daily afternoon tea. It is free of charge.

ASPEN EXCHANGE

"A journey is best measured in friends, rather than miles." – Tim Cahill Travelling, hosting, being a tour guide in your own back yard, discussing similarities and differences late into the evening is what being a participant on the Sister City Aspen Exchange is all about. It is enriching, life changing and character building for our young people and ourselves as teachers. Getting to know eight students from Wakatipu High School like they are extensions of yourself, seeing them treat their Aspen students like they are their family member, hosting another teacher and bonding in the same way. That is the magic of the Sister City Queenstown/Aspen Exchange.

We had an awesome group come to visit for 10 days over the last weeks of June. They were hosted by our amazing students and their even more amazing families. Allan and I got incredible support from local businesses to send the group on trips around the lower South Island. On their first day AJ Hackett Bungy plunged them into New Zealand tourism with a jump off the Kawarau bridge. NZSKI donated ski passes and equipment hire for the students to use for three days, a generous offer to say the least. Real Journeys ferried the group to Walter Peak for a quintessential farm show and morning tea. Go Orange tiki toured them to Milford Sound, where the weather added its mysterious mist and rain to heighten the landscape. The Kiwi Bird House hosted the group, so they could have an up close look at our native bird. Skyline entertained the group twice, once with the Honorable Mayor Jim Bolt to discuss the similarities and differences the two cities face, then again on Friday for the Kiwi Haka experience. There were countless discounts and vouchers from local businesses, including Fergburger providing an experience of what a burger can do to a town. Our community may be small, but the generosity and support we have received is huge.

There were weekends with families, attending sport, skiing and tasting local foods. As a group the students got together as much as they could to spend time as one big family. The generosity, support and can do attitude of our Wakatipu High School students and their incredible families meant that these visiting students felt right at home and slotted into kiwi lifestyle quickly.

Experiencing this exchange for the first time, I am filled with a sense of pride, exhaustion and excitement for what our little group will do when we travel to see them in January 2019. PORTOBELLO TRIP



Last week on Tuesday afternoon, a group of Year 13 Biology students had the privilege of travelling down to Dunedin and spending three days in the New Zealand Marine Studies Centre in Portobello. The intention of this trip was to conduct an individual experiment and learn scientific processes.

On the first day, the eager students caught the first whiff of sea salt as they searched high and low (but mainly low) under rocks, nooks and especially crannies for a range of different crab species. Throughout the day, we learnt about the anatomy, ecological niche and behaviour of these crabs. This knowledge was to lead us into our journey of crab and self-discovery on the second day of the trip.

It was the half crab that the majority of students chose to conduct their experiments on. We tested feeding responses, turnover time and the speed of the crab depending on a range of variables. It was hard not to squash the crabs as they nipped at our hands throughout the intense eight hours in the lab. The mentors had to keep a close eye on Jordyn after his tragic *"accident"* the previous day on the shore where one crab sadly lost its life. We were then treated to nachos and a relaxing evening after a busy day.

The third day was spent repeating these experiments and ensuring that any issue or errors from the second day were eliminated. By the end, we had accurate and reliable datasets to take home and analyse in Queenstown. Overall, it was a fantastic and informative time that was just as good as the Winterfest fireworks that we missed.

We would like to thank the incredible teachers that accompanied us on the trip, Mrs Christian and Mrs Jackson, as well as Steve and our other mentors at the centre for supporting us throughout the time.

Holden Street Smart is a world-class, cognitive based driver programme that aims to positively influence the lives of young kiwis across the country. The Programme has been developed with the involvement of world-renowned road safety expert, Peter Sheppard. In addition, passionate road safety advocate, Greg Murphy, is our Programme Ambassador.

Offering a practical hands-on learning experience, Holden Street Smart is a programme that aims to add to, and compliment, the great work already undertaken by NZTA, NZ Police and others in the area of road safety and driving training.

Holden Street Smart is a one-day event providing young drivers and their parents/caregivers the opportunity to undertake supervised driving practice. There is a focus on developing good decision-making strategies for safe driving, including assessing themselves, reading the road environment, resisting peer pressure, managing or eliminating distractions and planning ahead.

The Programme takes place in safe, controlled, off-the-road environments, under the watchful eye of qualified coaches plus the parent/caregiver. This provides the parent the opportunity to also assess themselves, in order to be a better coach and mentor to their teen.
