Kia ora - welcome to the Wakatipu High School newsletter. Like all of NZ, WHS has been impacted by and responded to the Christchurch attacks. On Monday morning we gathered as a school for some words and a moment's silence, as well as outlining the support in place for students. We also informed students that we will conduct a lockdown drill (which they will be briefed on) before the end of the term. During the week we passed on the information regarding it being an offense to possess or distribute copies of the video of the shootings, but we are aware that some of our students have viewed this. We encourage you to discuss this with your student and encourage them to seek support if they feel they need it. Today we had a multi-coloured mufti day to raise money for the victims of the tragedy and we observed the 2 minutes silence along with the rest of NZ. At Break 3 our students formed the word 'Kotahitanga' (which is our value inclusion) as a message of support to Christchurch - see below for more, including a great photo!

There are a number of important items below, and for some great news I would draw your attention to the Sports section which celebrates the incredible achievement of Alice Robinson who placed second (in the world!) in the GS at the final Alpine Ski World Cup, as well as some outstanding performances by our athletes in the recent Southland Secondary School champs.

Junior Next Steps (Parent-Teacher) - are next Tuesday 26th March. Hopefully by now junior parents have made a booking with their student's Kaiārahi (Ako teacher). These meetings are important and we do expect all to attend please - go to www.schoolinterviews.co.nz and enter the event code xbrgz. Please note that for all students school will finish at 1:50pm on Tuesday, with buses running from that time.

Senior Next Steps - are coming up soon on Tuesday 9th April. These follow the traditional 'five minutes with subject teachers' model, and we encourage senior parents to come along to meet teachers and be engaged with and support their student's learning, progress and achievement. Musical - also coming up soon now is the school musical, *Dusty*, which opens in less than two weeks! Next Week - is not only summer Tournament week, with many students away competing in a range of summer sports, but a very different week so please note:

- Tuesday: Junior Next Steps, school finishes and buses run from 1.50pm
- Friday: Teacher Only Day

Another significant week at WHS, but one in which we saw, as with the rest of the country, our young people respond strongly and positively to the horror of Christchurch. As Week 9 comes to a close there are now only three weeks and 13 days left in this term. Please note that with the short week next week and Teacher Only Day next Friday there will be no newsletter next week.

Our summer continues with good weather and warm temps until Monday at least - only two weeks until daylight saving ends so make the most of it. Enjoy the long weekend :)

Our Values

Trevor Moeke, Maori elder and community leader, explains that ‘tahi’ is the Maori word for one and ‘kotahi’ is the Maori word for single, therefore the word ‘kotahitanga’ is the Maori word for oneness. The students feel that this word encapsulates our message to the victims.

The initiative aligned with the national Colour Your Day movement in support of Christchurch and also the International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination, observed globally on the 21st March. - Stick to your normal routine
- Reach out for support
- Keep active

If you need support then get help. Go to your GP, counselling service , text 1737 for free counselling or contact a school guidance counsellor. vpatton@wakatipu.school.nz or ctweddell@wakatipu.school.nz.

1737 does provide interpreters however if you know someone who may need this service and has limited English then spend time helping them to prepare a message in English that they can text asking for an interpreter.

School Safety Drill

Subsequent to last Friday’s tragic events in Christchurch and all schools going into Lockdown, we know there is a lot of interest in our own Lockdown procedures. Our Lockdown procedures for our new building are slightly different from our previous ones at Fryer Street. To make sure everyone, particularly students, are comfortable with expectations during a Lockdown, we are scheduling a drill which will take place before the end of the term. The date and time of the drill will be notified to everyone in advance so no one is taken by surprise. Our local Police liaison officer will also be in attendance as an observer to provide feedback.

If a Lockdown is initiated, the school will use the School App to notify parents of the Lockdown and of any updates. Whilst we will not simulate this during our drill, please take the time to install the app if you have not done so already.

Parents should not under any circumstances make their way to the school to collect students during a Lockdown, unless they are advised to do so. If the school is in Lockdown then the doors will not be opened until the Police have advised us it is safe to do so.

Whilst we follow Ministry of Education guidelines and don’t publish our Lockdown procedures (to prevent potential threats pre-empting our plans), if, after the drill, you still have questions please email office @wakatipu.school.nz and we’ll do our best to answer them, although, depending on the particular scenario at hand, different circumstances may apply.

Head Students’ Address

Hey Everyone,

It’s been another action-packed week at Wakatipu High School. Gracie and Archie spoke in the assembly on Monday last week regarding the tragic events that happened in Christchurch and I thought the words spoken by Gracie were very powerful. “That we as a country, as a community and as a school are strong. Now it’s more important than ever to support one another. No matter who you are or where you come from you are accepted at Wakatipu High School, you are accepted in Queenstown and New Zealand is your home. We stand beside the Muslim community and the people of Christchurch.” This was and will be a very big event in New Zealand history and has made many kiwis reconsider how we approach topics such as ethnicity, sexuality, gender and religion. This week we, as a school, were very focused on upholding and representing our value of inclusion, kotahitaga.

This began with International Day on Wednesday which was a huge success. The Arts and Cultural Council ran the event to celebrate the unity of different cultures at WHS. The international students were enlisted to bring in cuisine from their different countries and cultures which was all sold at break 2. Spring Rolls from Vietnam, Belgium Speculoos and Waffles, Indian ladoos and German hefēzopfe were just a small portion of the selection on offer. All of the funds raised was donated to the Christchurch support fund. At break 3 we ran kahoots, or quizzes, in which a large range of students came to test their knowledge on different aspects on different cultures and countries around the world. This was an amazing day, demonstrating and celebrating inclusion and diversity.

Today we had a mufti day to show our support for the families, muslim communities and people impacted by the tragic events in Christchurch. Everyone dressed up in colourful attire and brought in a gold coin donation to send to Christchurch. At break 3 the school gathered on the field to take an aerial shot of our bodies forming the word Kotahitanga, our school value of inclusion. It has been amazing to watch our school band together and support each other in light of this tragic event. We have come together as a school and to celebrate diversity and demonstrate inclusion.

On another note there is one week left until we move into the Memorial Hall for musical and the cast is super excited to perform on stage, in front of you all. The musical is starting to properly come together with the band and cast rehearsing together for the last 2 weeks. Next week all the crews will begin coming to rehearsals and all the little pieces will start to come together and the story of Dusty Springfield will be presented onstage. With songs like ‘Son of a Preacher Man’ ‘Dancing in the Street’ and ‘My Generation.’ This year’s musical showcases the life and work of an amazing performer, someone whose career is what many of the students participating in the musical are aspiring to.

WHAT IS THE FUND?

The Waste Minimisation Community Fund is an initiative of Queenstown Lakes District Council's **WASTE MINIMISATION AND MANAGEMENT PLAN 2018** (WMMP).

The Council has up to \$50,000 available in 2018/19 to help support community-driven waste minimisation initiatives. The fund provides for initiatives that minimise waste, maximise resource recovery and support the WMMP vision and objectives.

WHO CAN APPLY?

The fund is open to community groups, businesses, iwi/Māori organisations, educational institutions and other community-based organisations operating in the Queenstown Lakes district.

WHAT CAN THE FUNDING BE USED FOR?

THE FUNDING CAN BE USED FOR:

“Hate Speech in the Age of the Internet: Challenges for All of Us” *A Catalyst Trust Conversation*

The Christchurch Mosque terrorist attack has made the significance of hate speech in the age of Internet horrifically clear. Distinguished Prof Paul Spoonley is a demographer of national renown who has extensively researched factors behind hate speech and recently chaired a government agency group on this “extremely challenging issue”.

What qualifies as hate speech and who decides? What does it do to respectful and positive relations among our communities? Can it be controlled, and if so, how?

“When I began to research the issue and its extent, I was appalled at how much there was and the degree to which racial and religious vilification played a part. I have studied anti-Semitism but what struck me was how extensive Islamophobic comments were, including from New Zealanders.

“And I was also struck by how particular groups – ethnic/religious minorities, youth – were impacted. The Christchurch terrorist attack has brought the significance of all this home. What lessons might we – as a society, community and individuals – learn?”

His original research was on anti-Semitism and the extreme right in New Zealand.
