Principal's Message

Term 2 has been a very busy, exciting and productive term, and as I prepare to write my reflections for the week, I can't help but think how fortunate I am to be able to work at Wakatipu High School.

The week and term was beautifully wrapped up today with our amazing Matatū (Haka/Waiata) Assembly in which our school community came together to showcase our school's values of Kotahitanga (unity/inclusion), Te manawanui me tū (Resilience) and Panekiretanga (excellence). Matatū means to stand firm, to show endurance and to be proud, and needless to say everyone who was there today felt that sense of pride and unity. Although the power in the area shut off just prior to the opening, our students persevered and delivered amazing performances. A huge thanks to all the students, leaders and teachers who participated and supported this wonderful event. A special thanks to our Kaitiati (judges) - Roni Bouchier, Jackie Kukutai and Ned Webster and to our kaiako (tutors) Callum O'Connell and Sydney Wallace. Prior to the start of the week, the annual Rockquest competition was held and while WHS usually performs well, the results from last Saturday night's competition were phenomenal, with WHS sweeping the top 3 in the bands and the top 2 in the solo acts. Yesterday, we watched our u14 rugby team beat Lane Cove from Australia beneath the snow-capped Remarkables and later last night, I received a phone call from an excited and exuberant group of young readers who had just been down to Southland to bring home the 2019 'Readers Cup' and qualify for nationals (see below for more details).

On Monday, I had the pleasure of attending a meeting with the trustees of the WHS Foundation. It was humbling to see and hear how so many members of the community give their time, energy and support for our school through the Foundation. These efforts do not go unnoticed and make a significant difference to both students and staff. We regard our June prediction as the first strong indicator of the year and I am very pleased to report that overall we are currently tracking very well in terms of our academic goals and student achievement.

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Senior Mid-Year Reports

Senior Mid-Year Reports will be available on the WHS Portal this evening.

Information regarding students' engagement, learning, progress and achievement is always live and available through the WHS Portal. However, a comprehensive mid-year report will be made available on the Portal for Seniors on Friday 5 July and Monday 29 July for Juniors. In addition to the information that is readily available through the Portal, the Senior Mid-Year Report will include a cover sheet that outlines the student's academic goal and current prediction. The prediction is an indicator of what the student is on track to achieve (or not), as of 21 June, assuming they maintain their current levels of achievement. Kaiārahi have been meeting with students to discuss the prediction and what changes, if any, are required to achieve their academic goal. If you have any questions regarding any general information in this report you should contact the Kaiārahi in the first instance. If you require subject specific information, please contact the relevant subject teacher. Again, Junior Mid-Year Reports will be available on the Portal from Monday 29 July, and we will have our Junior Next Steps on 13 August, when parents will again meet with Kaiārahi.

WHS Foundation

Established in 2013, The Wakatipu High School Foundation's primary goal is to be a vehicle for the community to support the school in delivering a great all-round education for the students of the Wakatipu Basin, and it has done that job incredibly well.

The Foundation funds a range of initiatives, from supporting students who are struggling financially to encouraging high academic achievement and making many important extra-curricular activities possible. Funding primarily comes from local business partners, annual events, investments, generous donors, appeals & grants.

Last year, the foundation committed a massive \$173,173 for a number of crucial WHS programmes - including extra curricular coaches (\$8,000), awhi financial hardship and BYOD support (\$35,000), professional learning (\$30,000) and staff release (\$73,625) - which increases teachers' capacity to effectively teach our students.

The WHS Foundation has had a very real and positive impact in our community since it began, raising a massive \$1.4 million dollars for our school - all thanks to the tireless work by those involved.

Trainsurfers and Haven move through to the next stage - submitting a 12 minute performance video assessed by a panel of industry professionals.

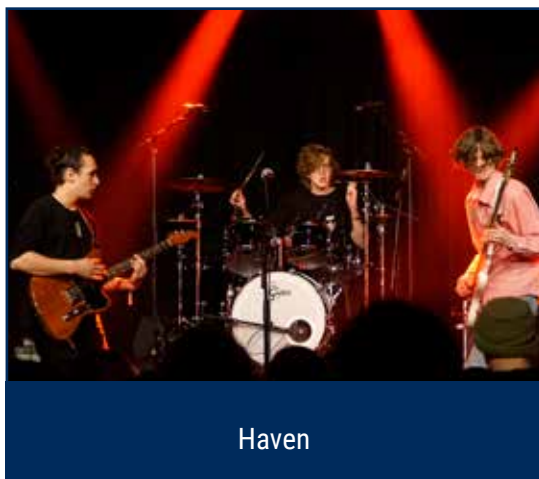

Archie to Attend International Science Event

A massive, massive congratulations to WHS Head Boy Archie Ritchie - who has been selected to attend the prestigious London International Youth Science Forum (LIYSF) later this month.

Archie went to the Auckland Science & Technology Forum in January, thanks to generous funding from **Rotary**, and won one of the only two trips to the LIYSF on 24 July. The London Forum is a two week residential student event held at Imperial College London & The Royal Geographical Society, with lecture demonstrations from leading scientists, visits to world class laboratories and universities combined with cultural interaction, with 500 students aged 16-21 years old from 70 countries.

Archie leaves for LIYSF on 18 July and will return on 15 August - with the highlights of his trips visits to Oxford, Cambridge, Paris, Geneva and the world's largest and most respected scientific research centre - CERN.

LIYSF will aim to cover a broad range of subjects across STEM fields (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) and students will be able to tailor their programme to suit their own STEM interests, however, the 61st LIYSF will have the underlying theme of: Science at the Interface.

Archie had an incredible experience during the Auckland event, standing out during his talks with the 'Youth Advisors' who mentor and coach the students while on the Forum. He was inspired so much that he is going to sign up to be an advisor at future forums.

It'll be a busy few weeks for Archie - he is also currently away at the 4-day New Zealand Model United Nations event at Victoria University in Australia after his application was selected from thousands of applicants.

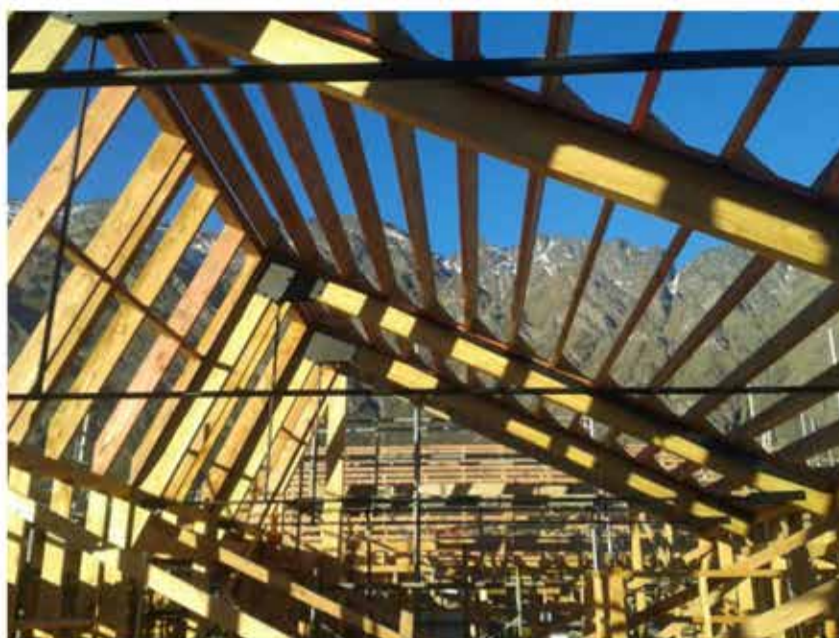

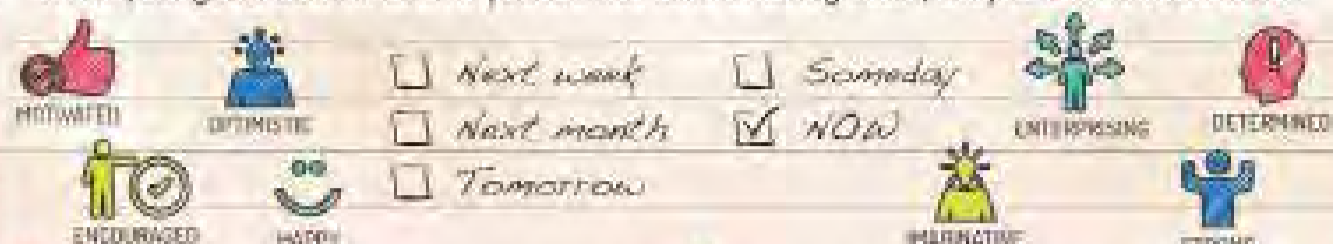

TIPS FOR SELF-MOTIVATION

Motivation sounds simple, and generally comes from within. It's the reason, behind our desire, knowing what we truly want. It's what inspires us to get things done and take ownership. Set goals... remember goals are really just dreams with deadlines.

Write your goals down... even if you are not fond of doing them, they still need to be done!



- Once you have set your goals you can then visualise the achieving, which will give you a feeling of what it may look like to help stay focused and motivated.
- Write down your 'why' if you ask yourself what it would mean to you to achieve your goal this allows you to uncover and provide you with further motivation. If you stop, you can revisit the why.
- Don't forget to research on what you are about to do. Know why you are doing something, as it is always harder to get something done if you don't have this clarity and a good reason to do it. The right amount of sleep goes a long way to keep you focused, up-beat and motivated.
- Do the toughest task first, this will ease a lot of your worries and boost your self-confidence for the rest of the day.
- Strive for progress... not necessarily perfection.
- Don't focus on the 'bad feeling' eliminate negative mental chat - have positive affirmations all around you. Learn to think more positively most of the time and let go of the negative thoughts before they have a chance to take control of you and influence your mood and motivation.
- Rather than jumping into something at full speed, start slower. Small successful steps are often easier to achieve and more successful in completing and achieving the bigger picture.
- Start... sometimes you don't need to have all of the details figured out before you get started.
- Don't fear failure, learn from your mistakes and go forward... this is a natural part of a successful life.
- Have faith in your abilities to succeed.
- Compare yourself with yourself. If you compare your results and what others have this can really knock your motivation. There are always people ahead of you or behind you, what does matter is staying focused on your direction and results.

- Celebrate the little wins... reward yourself and give yourself recognition. Every time you complete a task, give yourself a treat. This could be time to yourself at the shops, a pat on the back, have your hair done, an hour or so in the garden, or a walk along the beach etc... this can help keep you motivated.
- Work on your success, not someone else's.
- Review... it is important to see where you have gone wrong in the past to avoid similar actions in the future. This is a great motivator to see how much you have improved and how far you have come. Often you can be pleasantly surprised when you review where you have come from.
- Remember to have fun along the way.
- Take control of yourself, you must be in control of your life. There are many things outside of your control, of which you must accept. Greater Inequality, Weaker Democracy?

There are perhaps three fundamental questions about inequality. What are its impacts, why should we care and what can we – as a country – do about it?

Wealth inequality is accompanied by negative consequences for both individuals and society, including the erosion of democracy. Concentrated wealth can generate unequal political influence that in turn leads to policies reinforcing both economic and political inequality. Although so far spared the worst of these effects, New Zealand is by no means immune.

Max Rashbrooke – an author, journalist and academic who has written extensively on both subjects – will set out the challenges to equality and democracy and how they might be countered. He argues a much deeper democracy could deliver us the kind of government we need in the 21st century.

Max Rashbrooke has written and edited several works on income and wealth inequality in New Zealand, to help shape the growing debate on economic imbalances in this country. *Inequality: a New Zealand Crisis*, which he edited in 2013, was updated and republished late 2018. His most recent book - *Government for the Public Good: the Surprising Science of Large-Scale Collective Action* - looks at the privatisation and outsourcing of recent decades and suggests changes that might serve New Zealanders better. Both published by Bridget Williams Books (BWB) in late 2018.

He is a senior associate of the Institute for Governance and Policy Studies at Victoria University of Wellington. As a journalist, he has written for outlets in Britain and New Zealand including *The Guardian*, *National Business Review* and *Metro*. He has twice been the recipient of the Bruce Jesson Senior Journalism Award and was a 2015 Winston Churchill Fellow.



Could New Zealand Provide Global Leadership?

Can our small Pacific nation have an impact on global issues? And if so – how, in what areas and based on what values or principles?

These are some of the questions we will discuss as part of a community workshop co-hosted by Catalyst Trust and independent think tank, the New Zealand Alternative.

“There is a pressing need for progressive leadership on many fronts in the world and we believe New Zealand could provide it,” says NZA co-director Thomas Nash, who led the global campaign to ban cluster bombs and served on the board of the Nobel Prizewinning International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons.

“Or should we just determine our foreign policy in terms of support for allies and its impact on trade?”

Catalyst Trust’s August 7 workshop is part of a nationwide conversation NZA will lead on how we could contribute to our quickly changing and interconnected world. Feedback will help inform NZA’s resultant publication.

US ALLIANCES IN THE TRUMP ERA

Can America’s traditional alliances survive the Trump era? That is the question US – Asian alliances specialist Dr Shirley Smith will tackle for Catalyst Trust in Queenstown on July 22.

Dr Smith is the fifth annual Sir Howard Kippenberger Chair at the Centre for Strategic Studies, Victoria University of Wellington, that Catalyst Trust has had the honour of hosting. She is a senior fellow for Japan studies at the Council on Foreign Relations in Washington D.C.

Three years into the presidency of Donald Trump, US foreign policy seems transformed, Dr Smith says. “Reversals on international agreements have left allies unsure of the durability of US global commitments. Even allied assumptions about trade and defence cooperation have been upended, as an impulsive and contrarian president insists on putting ‘America first’.”



Doctor Smith is the author of several books (including *Japan Rearmed: the Politics of Military Power* and *Intimate Rivals: Japanese Domestic Politics and a Rising China*), a regular contributor to the CFR blog Asia Unbound and to major media outlets in the United States and Asia.
