Principal's Message

Kia ora and welcome to the Wakatipu High School newsletter as Term 4 gets underway. It has been a good week at school. I have been in the school quite a bit this week and things have been looking really good, with our seniors in particular very focused as the end of the year rapidly approaches.

One of the reasons I was around the school this week was taking a tour of local Rotary members, who generously support our school and students. It is always great to see people's reaction to our ILE school, especially when their educational experience was so different, including the modern learning and how settled the school is.

A lovely event we held on Wednesday this week was a whole school assembly to formally introduce our 2020 head students and prefects, and to present them with their badges. It was great to be able to acknowledge them in front of the whole school, and to also thank our outgoing 2019 head students - Archie Ritchie, Gracie Hansby, Thomas Hartono, Livvie Thompson and Tasman Hughes, who have done an outstanding job this year.

Discipline - has been significant for us recently. As a result of events and ongoing discussions the Board of Trustees has written an important letter to parents and students - please see below to read it.

As Principal I support the BoT's position. One of my key responsibilities is to ensure that WHS is a safe place for students and staff, something that parents also want and expect.

Accordingly, we are going to bring a drug detection dog through the school at some time in the next two weeks. While this is the first time we have done this at WHS, it is not uncommon for schools. We work hard to try and ensure that WHS is a safe place for students and staff and see this as a positive and proactive step to ensure that this is the case.

Again related to discipline, on Monday we had the opening of our Offsite Education facility. Based at the Wakatipu Youth Trust's new premises nearby, this is for students who are not functioning appropriately in some or all of their classes or the school system in general (including breaks). This will provide a smaller and more individualised education for these students, and means that teaching and learning is not being disrupted for others. A common feature of larger schools, this is an important step in ensuring a quality education and school experience for all students.

Phase 2 - is the expansion of the school from its current capacity of 1200 to 1800 students. There are several parts to the expansion: extensions of both of the long sides of the current school's 'rectangle' to the east (towards the shed and Playcentre); and a doubling in size of the gym to the west (beside Admin, towards Red Oaks Dr).

You may recall that in early June I wrote that we had been told that Phase 2 was on track to be completed by the end of 2020, however we were recently informed that this is not the case. We were not happy about this, and have been actively encouraging the Ministry of Education to get the project back on track and completed as soon as possible. This has resulted in activity and progress, and the latest dates we have been given have the various parts being completed between early and mid-2021.

A point to note at this stage is that - whenever the work happens, there will be disruption to the current school building and site at times during construction. While we will endeavour to have this work done at times of the year which are better for us there will need to be a balance between that and the progress of the project.

A final point to make about Phase 2 is that it is going to be fantastic when it is finished. We have had input into the preliminary design and are excited about the additional spaces and facilities for WHS. We will keep you posted as the project takes shape.

Internet Usage - below is a piece regarding internet usage by students - some of whom use extraordinary amounts of data, and a quota that we are going to apply. The quota is still very generous and students' learning will not be impacted, but please see below for more.

WHS Foundation Golf Tournament - the WHS Foundation are very generous and important supporters of WHS. Their financial support makes a significant difference to our ability to deliver our great all-round education. One of their key fundraising events is the annual Golf Tournament at Millbrook on Wednesday 11th December. Please see below for details, including how to register. This is always a fantastic day so please get a team together for a great day out for a great cause!

Excellence and Ad Alta Assemblies - these important ceremonies are next week, in Houses. Prizewinners have been notified, and parents are welcome.

Junior PAS Reports - are now available on the Portal. If you do have any questions regarding the Report please contact your student's Kaiarahi, Dean or subject teachers as appropriate.

Two big weeks lie ahead, with some of the most important events of the year, including Sporting and Cultural Blues as well as Senior Prizegiving. It is also an important time for seniors in particular as they now have only eight school days left until Senior Prizegiving. They need to be both encouraged and supported to be focused on their studies at this time - whether it is final internals and/or studying for exams. A mixed spring weekend of weather ahead, with some sun and some showers, some wind but mild temps - with Saturday best for being outside and mowing the lawns. Go the All Blacks!!

Board of Trustees Letter

WHS Stance on Illegal Drugs

The Landscape

Illegal drugs are in our community and living with them is a reality. That said, there is no intent for WHS to adopt a tolerant view.

WHS has the opportunity to provide leadership within the community. To prepare students for their futures, some common-sense boundaries are required. As a school we need to define and apply consequence for breaching those boundaries – similar to what would happen in any workplace.

These consequences need to be consistent, respected and send the message that it is definitely not ok to possess, use or supply illegal drugs at WHS, or when representing the school.

Ministry of Education Guideline

MOE instructs School Boards to retain students in school where possible and dictates that a pre-determined position cannot be defined prior to a Disciplinary Committee Meeting. The WHS Board accepts this view and while the consequence will not be pre-determined, it can be assumed that any breach of our drug policy will jeopardise the student's future at WHS.

Our Position

WHS exists in a community with numerous positive influences – with many and varied opportunities to achieve at the highest levels, both at school and in the community. We have students who achieve great things and possess within the school community Academics, Musicians, Artists and Thespians who are amongst NZ's best, alongside highly competitive Sport teams and individuals. It is easy to underestimate the amount of effort and dedication that goes into achieving these results.

Our WHS vision is to deliver Aotearoa's best all round education and this is a reality when considering where we are located, the community support the school has, world class facilities and the people who work at and attend the school. Sometimes conversation in the community is dominated by the disappointing actions of a tiny minority of students who place a fog over our successes by making poor personal choices.

The Board want to make it absolutely clear to students, parents, and the wider community that the use of drugs by students is not tolerated. We will continue to take a firm stance on the issue. If students make bad personal choices, they will face consequences that will jeopardise their future at WHS. This is underpinned by the fundamental right for students and teachers to feel safe at school.

This communication is designed to send a clear message that a student's ability to attend WHS will be compromised and restricted if the Drug Policy is breached.

Student Data Usage

Further to our newsletter notification on 23 August, we have been reviewing the data usage by students. Some students are using an extraordinary amount of data including on non-education related streaming sites such as Netflix and YouTube. The amount of data being consumed by these students not only slows down the network for teaching and learning, but can also be an indication of students not engaged in their learning.

As a result we are implementing a quota on the amount of data students can use each week. We believe that the quota is still very generous at 2.5 GB per week (approx 30 minutes of high definition or 1 hour of standard definition streaming per day). When students reach the quota they will no longer be able to download until it resets at the start of the following school week. Please note that the quota does not apply to educational sites (eg Google Classroom, Education Perfect etc) and so learning will not be impacted.



Before School and After School Drop Off

A reminder to all parents that Red Oaks Drive, outside of WHS, is a no-stopping zone and vehicles are not permitted to stop in bus stops, cycle lanes or on dotted yellow lines. We are increasingly concerned about the safety of our students as vehicles pull out into traffic, perform U-Turns or block the bus area whilst students are crossing the road as they arrive and depart school each morning. It is disappointing to hear that the QLDC staff monitoring the area have been subjected to abuse by both parents and students. Please take this opportunity to talk to students about responsible driving behaviour, and set a good example by complying with road regulations.

Parents picking up students after school are also reminded that they should not be parking in the car parking spaces at the back of Remarkables House whilst waiting to collect their children. These spaces belong to, and are paid for by the tenants in the building. The school has received repeated feedback (and photos) of parents using these parking spots. Parents wishing to avoid traffic within the school perimeter are encouraged to meet their children in the public car park on Hawthorne Drive which is 250m from the school and has free parking for 2 hours.




