Student Focus - Isabella Jack

Some students' personality, passions and ambitions appear almost custom-built for excellence in a particular area. Our fifth Youthmark Student Focus Feature, Isabella Jack, certainly gives such an impression; in drama and the arts, she's found an enduring enthusiasm she appears to have been destined for.

"I've always been willing to stand up and be excited about doing a play or drama," she says. "I just always wanted to give it my all!"

And she has given it her all throughout her time at WHS - this year she student-directed the 2018 Wakatipu High School Musical -'Little Shop of Horrors', and was also a co-director for two plays, playing the lead role in one, at the 2018 Sheilah Winn competition. Her performance at Sheilah Winn was so outstanding that she was selected for Shakespeare Globe Centre New Zealand's National Shakespeare Schools Production.

While attending NSSP this term, her talents were again selected;

Izzy will be one of just 24 students nationally to be part of the Young Shakespeare Company visiting London next July for intensive drama training - where she'll have the opportunity to perform at the world-renowned Globe Theatre.

She's also found dramatic success as part of WHS's One Act Play. She played the lead in 2017's "Can You Keep A Secret", receiving an "Excellence in Acting" acknowledgement in the process, and finished as a national finalist in this year's adaptation of NZ playwright Renee's 'Tiggy Tiggy Touchwood'. It was the fourth year out of five that WHS students had reached the national One Act Play finals.

For the 18-year old, who also received the Wakatipu High School Arts Cup for All Round Commitment to Drama at this year's Senior Prizegiving, it's been a long-term devotion.

"When I was 11 I got involved with the Queenstown School of Drama, which Kate Moetaua, our lovely drama teacher, ran. I've always had a passion for signing too - I did singing lessons for a number of years, and just recently I taught myself guitar."

"Kate was just a pinnacle of support for me, and I owe a lot of where I am today to her, because it was her who first got me into drama."

Describing her acting style as 'Stanislavskian' - after early-20th century russian playwright Konstantin Stanislavski - Isabella clearly understands her passion for arts comes from an inquisitive curiosity about human nature. As a result, she's considering pursuing psychology or criminology at university in 2020, following a gap year during which she'll head abroad as part of the Young Shakespeare Company.

"I like the idea of helping people - we have such a massive mental health crisis in New Zealand, with very high suicide rates, and if I can contribute to advance a better future then I'd love to."

Of course, she'll continue to pursue drama, either as a career choice or a part-time passion.

"I know acting is a fickle industry, but I've never tried to let that put me off... I am so so passionate about performance, and shakespeare, and there is a great window of opportunity - especially in this community where we have so many talented people - to make the arts grow."

Ultimately, she says, "you've just got to do what you love - because life is short - even if it doesn't feel like it at my age. You've just got to seize the day and do what you're passionate about."




